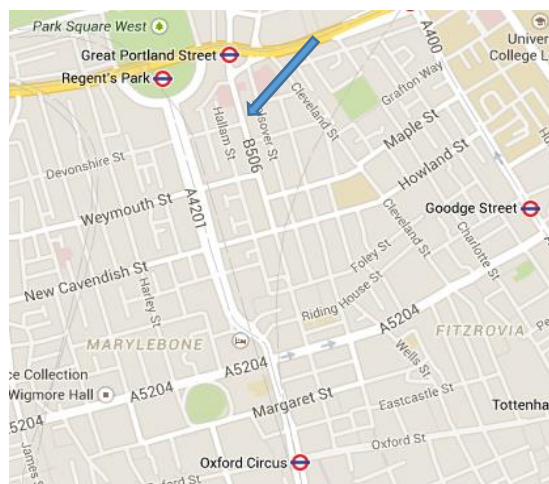


Symposium on Children's Dental Health 2013 National Survey

It brings together leading academics from the fields of paediatric dentistry, dental public health and health psychology, who will speak at the event.

The survey is the fifth in a series of national children's dental health surveys carried out every 10 years since 1973. It is an unrivalled source of information on the dental health of children in the England, Wales and Northern Ireland, and their experiences of dental care and treatment and oral hygiene. It also measures changes in oral health since the last survey in 2003.

Speaker biographies

Tom Anderson

Tom is a Principal Research Officer in the ONS Social Survey Division. He was the ONS survey manager for the 2013 Children's Dental Health Survey, as well as the overall project manager for the consortium. Tom has worked in national survey research for fourteen years and at ONS since 2007, where he has also been involved in the successful delivery of the 2009 Adult Dental Health Survey and English Housing Survey. Tom has an MSc with commendation in Sociology from the University of Bristol.

Professor Barbara Chadwick

Professor and Honorary Consultant in Paediatric Dentistry, and Head of the Paediatric Dentistry Unit at the School of Dentistry, Cardiff University. Her clinical and research training was undertaken in Cardiff where she completed her Master and PhD. The two major aims of her research are to identify methods of reducing health inequalities and clinical effectiveness. Her current NIHR funded projects include a randomised controlled trial of fissure sealants versus Fluoride varnish in a Welsh primary school and a multi-centred randomised controlled clinical trial of three treatment approaches to caries in primary teeth. She was a member of the consortium group that undertook the 2003 CDHS and 2009 ADHS. She is an editorial board member for the International Journal of Paediatric Dentistry and a Member of the British Dental Association Health and Science Committee.

Elizabeth Fuller

Liz is a Research Director in the Health and Wellbeing team, part of the NatCen's Research Department. She has worked for NatCen Social Research since 2001 and has wide experience of managing, analysing and reporting on health-related surveys, including the Adult Dental Health Survey 2009, the survey of Smoking, Drinking and Drug Use among Young People in England, the evaluation of the National Healthy Schools programme and the Welsh Health Survey.

Dr Kirsty B Hill

Senior lecturer in Behavioural Science and Dental Public Health. Kirsty moved to Birmingham in 1999 to work on the National Evaluation of Personal Dental Services and was appointed to her current role in 2001. She was involved in the 2003 CDHS and 2009 ADHS. Her professional interests include the barriers to dental care, dental anxiety and patients' perceptions of dental services. Kirsty has been Chair of Governors for the past 5 years and a foundation governor for a further 5 years at St Joseph's Catholic in Sutton Coldfield and a foundation governor at Bishop Walsh Catholic School for the past 2 years.

Dr Richard Holmes

Richard is a Senior Lecturer in Dental Public Health at Newcastle University and Honorary Consultant in Dental Public Health with Public Health England. Richard spent four years in primary dental care before embarking on a higher training programme as an NIHR Academic Clinical Fellow and then Clinical Lecturer in Dental Public Health. His PhD was funded by NIHR under a 3-year Doctoral Research Fellowship and his thesis focused upon Priority Setting in Dental Health Care and the use of health economics to inform commissioning decisions. Richard was a clinical examiner for the 2009 Adult Dental Health Survey and he was involved in the training of examiners and report writing for the 2013 Child Dental Health Survey.

Professor Emeritus John Murray CBE

John Murray was appointed Professor of Child Dental Health at Newcastle University in 1977. In addition, he was Dental Postgraduate Dean from 1982 until 1992 and Dean of Dentistry from 1992 until his retirement in 2002. He was Chairman of the Standing Dental Advisory Committee for six years, Chairman of the Clinical Standards Advisory Group's inquiry into services for cleft lip and/or palate and Chairman of the Education Committee of the General Dental Council from 1998 to 2003. He carried out the pilot study for the first national survey into Adult Dental Health in 1968 and has been involved in most of the national surveys of child and adult dental health in the United Kingdom.

Professor Nigel B Pitts

Nigel was the Director of the Dental Health Services Research Unit at the University of Dundee from 1985 and since January 2013 is Director of the Innovation and Translation Centre at Kings College London Dental Institute. Nigel has played leading roles in a range of dental surveys: 1) in Scotland, he was scientific coordinator for the Scottish Health Boards Dental Epidemiological Programme (SHBDEP) since 1987 and then the National Dental Inspection Programme (NDIP); 2) since 1991 he has co-led the NHS/British Association for the Study of Community Dentistry (BASCD) Dental Epidemiology Programme (he is a BASCD Past President); 3) At the European level, Nigel was a key collaborator in the European Global Oral Health Indicators (EGOHID) project which supported public health decision-making by providing high quality, relevant and timely data, information and knowledge of oral health in Europe, and he also leads the Dental Caries Epidemiology and Prevention Special Interest Group of the European Association for Dental Public Health (where he is also a Past President); 4) Nigel has participated in the 1988, 1998 and 2009 ADHS as well as the 2003 CDHS.

Professor Jimmy Steele CBE

Jimmy Steele graduated in dentistry from Dundee in 1985. After hospital appointments in Dundee, Perth and Glasgow, and obtaining FDS, he was appointed as a lecturer in Restorative Dentistry in Newcastle in 1989, was made a personal Senior Lecturer in 1999 and then a personal chair in Oral Health Services Research in 2003. He also holds an honorary NHS consultant in Restorative Dentistry in Newcastle. His PhD was a very large epidemiological study of oral health in older adults, funded by DH and awarded in 1994. His subsequent experience in national epidemiology is very extensive and has included leading roles in NDNS 65+, ADHS 1998 and 2009 and CDHS 2003. His health services research includes primary care, quality of life and health economics. He is oral and dental lead for the UKCRN. He led the Review of NHS Dental Services in England in 2009 (the "Steele Report") and is involved in the DH contract reform program.

Dr Georgios Tsakos

Dr Tsakos is a Senior Lecturer in Dental Public Health, Department of Epidemiology and Public Health, University College London (UCL) and an Honorary Consultant in Dental Public Health for Islington Primary Care Trust, London. He is also a Fellow of the Faculty of Public Health. Dr Tsakos graduated in Dentistry from University of Athens in 1990. He did an MSc in Dental Public Health at University of London, worked in the NHS Community Dental Services, and then completed a PhD at University of London. Thereafter, he worked for Deloitte & Touche Consulting in Greece and in 2001 was appointed President and Chief Executive Officer in the Regional Health System of Sterea Hellas in Greece. He joined the Department of Epidemiology and Public Health at UCL in 2002. Dr Tsakos' main research interests are on: 1) measures of oral health-related quality of life, and their use for needs assessment (planning services) and evaluating health interventions, 2) social determinants of oral health inequalities, and 3) the relationship between oral and general health. Dr Tsakos worked on the 2009 ADHS. He is also President of the European Association of Dental Public Health and has served in the Behavioural Epidemiologic and Health Services Research Group of the International Association of Dental Research.

Professor Elizabeth Treasure

Elizabeth is Deputy Vice Chancellor and Professor of Dental Public Health at Cardiff University. She was previously Dean and General Manager of the Dental School and Dental Division of Cardiff and Vale Health Board and Honorary consultant of Dental Public Health. She has wide experience of dental practice in the UK and New Zealand having practised and been an academic in both countries. She led the Dental Public Health Unit which includes the Welsh Oral Health Information Unit from 2001 until becoming Dean of the School. Elizabeth has worked on the Adult Dental Surveys of 1988, 1998 and 2009. She has broad experience in dental epidemiology, systematic reviews and clinical effectiveness.

Professor Richard G Watt

Richard is Professor of Dental Public Health and Head of the Department of Epidemiology and Public Health at University College London. He also holds an honorary consultant post with Central and North West London NHS Foundation Trust. He graduated in dentistry from the University of Edinburgh in 1984 and proceeded to study for an MSc and PhD in Dental Public Health at the University College London. His research has focused on the social determinants of oral health inequalities and the development and evaluation of health improvement interventions. He has recently been awarded the 2014 International Association for Dental Research Distinguished Scientist Award for Behavioural, Epidemiologic and Health Services Research. He has sat on a variety of expert working groups for the Department of Health, Public Health England, National Institute for Clinical Excellence, WHO and E.U. He is co-author of *Essential Dental Public Health* and has published more than 220 publications.

Professor Deborah White

Deborah is Professor of Dental Public Health with the University of Birmingham, where she is also the Director of Education, and Honorary Consultant in Dental Public Health with Birmingham Community NHS Trust. Deborah's early career was spent in the Community Dental Service and she joined the School of Dentistry in Birmingham in 1999, completing her PhD shortly afterwards. Deborah has had wide experience of dental epidemiology including NDNS 4-18, ADH 1998 and 2009 and CDH 2003 and 2013. Other research interests centre on patterns of service provision and patient referrals.
